
The following information will help you become familiar with each piece of your collection.

One True Sentence C: Tools of Style 4

Take it from Hemingway:

"All you have to do is write one true sentence. Write the truest sentence you know."

Rhetoric is the art of writing effectively. It is the study of how writers use language effectively. The best way to learn rhetorical tools is to use rhetorical tools.

The goal is to produce well-formed, exceptional sentences. A singular sentence is simply a collection of words that conveys an idea. When well-crafted sentences are connected wisely, one after another, meaning flows, carrying that idea forward in a clear and concise manner. Over the course of 20 weeks, students will be introduced to twenty tools that will help them construct their ideas effectively. Following are some strategies that will help you begin:

- 1. Begin by reading the introductory material in the student guid, focusing especially on the two pages dedicated to you, the teacher (*For the Teacher*).
- 2. Flip to the student pages for Week 1 and read the directives to familiarize yourself with the layout. Each week will be formatted similarly. On Day 1 the student will be presented with a new concept to discover and will be prompted through a constructive activity. The student is then prompted to craft 5 more sentences utilizing the tool that is introduced. The exercises take about 45 minutes to an hour per week.

Operation Lexicon: The Inklings

A lexicon is the collected vocabulary utilized by a writer. Over the course of 26 weeks, students will explore a cluster of words from the lexicon of C.S. Lewis and J.R.R. Tolkein. Using these words in an original way, with inspiration from her many short stories and letters, will help the budding wordsmith recognize the plasticity of language and delight in its beauty.

- 1. Everything for the teacher is included in the front of the student guide. Begin by reading the *Introduction* followed by the *How to use this Guide* —3 short pages! Encourage your student to read along.
- 2. Read, together with your student the information about Ted Hughes.
- 3. With your student, look through the **Story Starters** and the **Day 3 micro-story example** before beginning the work.
- 4. Each week contains three days of lessons. These lessons are guided by a built-in-mentor for your student to be guided in the work. Familiarizing yourself with one week will help you to better support your student. Day 1 and 2 will take about 15 minutes each, while Day 3 may take a bit longer, 30 minutes to an hour, because it involves application of the words and a bit of creativity.

Finally, here is an encouragement from Tolkein (letter to his son Christopher, January 30, 1945):

"A story must be told or there'll be no story, yet it is the untold stories that are the most moving."







Intro to Composition: The Essay - Volume 3

The Literary Essay

Your student will be guided on an exploration of literary essay form. Utilizing picture books with sophisticated themes, and a 30-sentence form, they craft their ideas into a tightly knit essay. They will learn how to cite examples from stories using the MLA format in the process.

How to get started:

- 1. Begin by reading through the *Table of Contents* and the *For the Teacher* pages in the student guide. These few pages will help you prepare your student to become self-directed along the way. This volume includes 5 lessons that will be completed over 10 weeks. In each lesson, the first week, students will be directed to complete all of the preparatory writing that will enable them to complete all the pre-writing for the essay at hand. The second week of each lesson, students will craft the literary essay, Student Self-Evaluation, and the polished draft.
- 2. Next, sit down with your student to introduce the *For the Student* pages. These pages provide information that can be referenced as needed. During this sit down, study together the one-page *The Blueprint Literary Essay* and read the *The Model Literary Essay* to see the blueprint in action.

Over the course of 10-weeks your student will compose 5 singularly original literary essays. Great essays have the power to encourage, empower, and enlighten both the writer and the reader.

Research Writing: Elemental Journal

Elemental Journal is an interesting and broad introduction into the fascinating realm of chemistry. This discovery journal guides students on a wonderful voyage through the mysteries of the periodic table. Over the course of a year, students will research and catalog their findings of 42 of the 144 known elements. Divided into elemental groups (alkali, alkaline, transition, boron, carbon, nitrogen, oxygen, halogens, noble gases, lanthanides, actinides, and superheavies), each group begins with a reading assignment that gives general information about that group. Students are then prompted to independently research the resources and write a brief paragraph about their discoveries. Space is provided to catalog the element's characteristic

data. Each week, as a culminating activity, students visit the University of Nottingham Periodic Table of Videos on the internet, click on the particular element, and, in a few sentences, summarize the information they find intriguing.

How to get started:

- 1. At the front of the student journal is a blank map that can be completed by the student as element research is completed.
- 2. Read closely the *Table of Contents* and the introductory material in the student guide: *What you Will Need, How this Guide is Organized* and *How to Use this Guide*. These few pages will enable you to support your student along the way.
- 3. Flip through the first few sections of the student guide to familiarize yourself with what is expected of the student.

Everything you can imagine is made of the elements! This guide will provide your student with a broad introduction to the foundation of chemistry.



This 40 week schedule represents about 9 months on the calendar, allowing for 175–180 days of instruction after accounting for breaks and holidays. The following is a suggested outline showing how the pieces of your Grade Level Collection can be puzzled together over the course of the school year. Any of the elements can be staggered and/or spread out in order to meet your particular needs, creating a varied and comprehensive learning experience.



Literature + Writing: Level 3 - Year Pack E · 5 days/week, 60 - 90 minutes/day · 36 Weeks

Use 4 weeks to complete the story activities. Use week 5 for project build. Use week 6 for project presentation and review.

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One True Sentence C: Tools of Style 4 · 3-5 days/week, 15-30 minutes/day · 20 Weeks

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Operation Lexicon: The Inklings • 3 days/week, 15-30 minutes/day • 24 Weeks

Begin on week 6.

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Intro to Composition: The Essay - Volume 3 • 1 day/week, 60—90 minutes/day • 10 Weeks
